A newsletter collects news, no matter whether they cause joy or sadness. In the past weeks we have been saddened to learn that Robert Blecker (1956-2026) has passed away. Robert was a leading heterodox economist, widely known for his applications of post-Keynesian ideas to questions on international trade and finance, many of which turned into archetypical contributions that helped guide the further development of the field. Just recently, this Newsletter featured a [Special Issue in the *Review of Keynesian Economics*](#)⁴ dedicated to illuminating and expanding Robert Blecker's work on international economics. His major textbook on [Heterodox Macroeconomics](#)⁵ – authored jointly with Mark Setterfield – can and should be seen as a lasting contribution that illustrates and underscores Robert's masterful scholarship.

On top of all that, Robert was also a community guy – he regularly sent updates and comments to the Newsletter and was one of the first international readers to join the *International Association for Political Economy and Heterodox Economics (IAPHE)* we created last year to provide institutional and foundational support to the Heterodox Economics Newsletter. Tellingly, Robert insisted on becoming an “active” rather than merely a “supporting” member – a small gesture that speaks to the passionate, all-in attitude that inspired and motivated me. I suspect many younger researchers had similar experiences with Robert, who was not only an archetypical scholar but also a generous and inspiring colleague.

If you want to read up a little on Robert's work, I can – in addition to what is mentioned above – recommend his [highly cited classic](#)⁶ on the interplay of international competition, distribution and growth, his [take on the profit-led vs. wage-led debate](#)⁷ or one of his more specialized papers on development economics. Two key candidates in the latter category are [his work on the interaction of gender equality and export success](#)⁸ (with Stephanie Seguino) as well as his insightful analysis of [fallacies of compositions in trade policy](#)⁹ (with Arslan Razmi), which asks what happens if all countries try to expand manufacturing at the same time.

Call for Proposals for Special Issues in the Socio-Economic Review

[Socio-Economic Review \(SER\)](#)¹² is pleased to invite proposals for Special Issues to be published in 2027 or 2028.

A Special Issue is a peer reviewed collection of articles on a specific theme. The theme should normally focus on a new or distinctive area of inquiry insufficiently explored in socio-economic literature, has a broad relevance, and falls within the aims and scope of the journal. Thereby, a special issue provides an opportunity to collectively explore a new topic, develop insightful new lines of research and exchange in dialogue across disciplines such as sociology, political science, economics, business, law, or history.

The proposal should contain the following information:

1. The names, contact details, and positions of the proposed Guest Editors together with brief biographical details.
2. The title of the proposed special issue.
3. A one-page Call for Papers indicating the main theme, key topics, and methodological foci for submissions to the Special Issue.
4. A list containing titles and short abstracts of any potential contributions, information about the authors and indication of their commitment. Guest editors are not permitted to submit regular peer review papers for the special issue but are encouraged to write a substantive introductory article developing the state of the art around the topic.
5. A description of the behind the proposal, its planned scope, innovative nature in relation to existing published work, and likely relevance for readers of Socio-Economic Review. Please read the Editorial Policy Statement of SER via the following webpage:
6. An envisioned timetable including a deadline for the first submission, a period for review and resubmission, and deadline for final print-ready papers.

The team of Guest Editors for the Special Issue will handle all manuscripts from their initial submission; they assign reviewers, and they make decisions (reject, revise, conditionally accept) and communicate those decisions to the authors. While Special Issues are always accompanied by an Open Call for Papers, Guest Editors are also encouraged to reach out to potential contributors to solicit quality submissions. All manuscripts for the Special Issue must undergo double-blind peer review and revisions according to normal SER review process and in accordance with SER's editorial policy and formal guidelines. Final acceptance of papers is done in consultation with the Chief Editors of SER.

A special issue typically has 6-10 regular length papers plus editors' introduction. SER manuscripts are generally no longer than 10,000 words in length (inclusive of references, but excluding tables, figures, appendices and online appendices). Manuscripts should follow a clear line of argument and be written in a concise style without sacrificing meaningful content.

Call for sessions: World Economic History Congress 2028 (Montevideo, July 2028)

24-28 July, 2028 — Montevideo, Uruguay

Conference theme: World Powers and Conflicts

The 21st World Economic History Congress will convene from 24 to 28 July 2028 in Montevideo, Uruguay. The IEHA has a particular interest in strengthening the scientific approach to the historical and social sciences and in promoting exchange, cooperation, and understanding among all people.

The theme of the Congress is World Powers and Conflicts, which highlights central issues facing humanity today and connects to a broad and diverse range of historical problems, particularly those concerned with resources, inequality, and sustainability, central topics of the last two congresses (Paris and Lund).

Sessions may be proposed by any member of the international economic history community, whatever their institutional affiliation or status, as well as by scholars in related disciplines. The organizers strongly encourage proposals from early-career researchers. Sessions can also be proposed by non-national IEHA member organizations.

Submissions are welcome on the economic and social histories of all places and periods, and the organizers especially encourage proposals from the global South. Given the diversity of the membership, the organizers will consider any submission that advances the study, teaching, and public presentation of economic history. The organizers welcome panel proposals that highlight emerging scholarship from different fields of economic history, as well as contributions on innovative methodological and theoretical approaches.

The 5-day Montevideo Congress will feature approximately 180 sessions, with each day divided into 90-minute blocks (two before and two after lunch). It will be possible to combine two sessions into larger, coherent units. The proposals must make clear whether they apply to one or two blocks.

Conference theme: Democracy Under Pressure: Conditions of the Authoritarian Turn Yesterday and Today

The conference brings together scholars from law and socioeconomics to examine the current rise of authoritarian tendencies around the world and to explore which socio-economic, legal, and institutional responses could strengthen democratic resilience. The conference addresses these challenges in dialogue with four pivotal thinkers – Friedrich Hayek, Karl Polanyi, Hans Kelsen, and Carl Schmitt – whose influential yet antagonistic accounts of the proper economic and constitutional order remain highly relevant for contemporary debate. Confirmed keynote speakers are Katharina Pistor (Columbia University) and Quinn Slobodian (Boston University).

The organizers welcome the submission of individual abstracts as well as proposals for complete panels from scholars in law, socioeconomics, political economy, constitutional theory, political science, economic sociology, history and related research fields — at all career stages, and from all regions, including the Global South.

Workshop theme: The Return of Industrial Policy: Historical Lessons and Contemporary Challenges

Industrial policy has returned to the centre stage of economic policymaking. Across the EU, the US, and East Asia, governments are increasingly intervening to support strategic sectors, strengthen supply chains, accelerate the green transition, and secure technological leadership. Initiatives such as the EU Green Deal Industrial Plan, the Net-Zero Industry Act, and the European and US Chips Acts reflect a broader shift toward active state involvement in industrial transformation and economic security. After decades in which industrial policy played a more limited role in advanced economies, geopolitical tensions, supply-chain disruptions, and decarbonisation have renewed interest in state-led economic coordination. Consequently, questions surrounding subsidies, strategic protection, industrial targeting, innovation policy, and economic resilience have returned to the forefront of academic research and policymaking.

While of contemporary relevance, government efforts to shape industrial development have a long history. States have long sought to influence the direction and location of eco-

conomic activity. This historical record provides a valuable laboratory for understanding past successes and failures and informing future policy.

The organizers invite completed papers or extended abstracts by Friday 28 August 2026, with preference given to completed papers. Applications are welcome from researchers at all career stages. Submissions will be selected on originality, analytical rigor, and policy relevance.

Journal of Institutional Economics: Symposium on "The Institutional Foundations of Stakeholder Theory. Insights from Original and Non-Mainstream Institutional Economics"

Stakeholder theory is often presented as an ethical correction to shareholder primacy. That framing captures an important normative disagreement, but it leaves the theory's institutional content underdeveloped. Firms and corporations are not neutral containers within which managers decide whose interests to consider. They are institutional arrangements constituted by formal and informal rules that allocate authority, voice, property claims, responsibilities, exposure to risk, and access to remedies.

The stakeholder question is therefore not only whether managers should care about non-shareholding groups. It is how institutions define relevant participants, organise their interdependence, structure conflicts, distribute decision rights, and adapt when existing rules cease to support viable cooperation.

The symposium's organising question

How do institutions constitute stakeholder relationships, distribute authority and vulnerability among stakeholder groups, and evolve in response to conflict, uncertainty, power, and changing social and ecological conditions?

Original institutional economics offers powerful resources for this task. Veblen directs attention to evolving habits, technologies, power structures, and ceremonial valuations. Commons treats institutions as collective action that controls, liberates, and expands individual action, and analyses transactions as legally and socially constituted relations

involving conflict, dependence, bargaining, and working rules. Later institutionalist work extends these insights through social provisioning, cumulative causation, institutional change, and the legal-economic nexus.

The symposium also welcomes contributions drawing on post-Keynesian, feminist, ecological, behavioural, humanistic, evolutionary, social, legal, comparative, polycentric, and organisational approaches. These traditions are relevant when they illuminate the design, operation, persistence, change, or comparative effects of identifiable institutions. The collection will not be a loose set of critiques of mainstream economics; it will be a focused institutional analysis of stakeholder governance.

Europe stands at a critical macroeconomic crossroads. As the continent grapples with the compounding pressures of structural economic crisis, geopolitical fragmentation, and the

urgent need for unprecedented socio-ecological investment, conventional market-driven paradigms are failing to provide viable answers.

As highlighted in the recent landscape report by Partners for a New Economy (P4NE), “Fertile Ground: Exploring Europe’s New Economy Ecosystem”²³, if we are to successfully navigate this era of interlocking crises, the field must elevate macroeconomic planning. No longer dismissed as a relic of the past, strategic public coordination and structural steering are re-emerging as essential tools to reshape the future of European capital, navigate fiscal rules, and steer the green transition. This event brings together leading voices in political economy to dissect how democratic, structural economic planning can be effectively revived and translated to viable policy solutions.

The Panel

Ilias Alami (Assistant Professor at the University of Cambridge, Member of the Green Planning Commission) – will illustrate how the global rise of state-owned enterprises and sovereign wealth funds expands the scope for progressive economic intervention, while questioning how we can push past these frameworks toward deeper systemic transformation.

Jacob Hasselbalch (Associate Professor at Copenhagen Business School) will compare historical and contemporary planning models—spanning France, Denmark, South Korea, and China—to show how states can deploy long-term macroeconomic steering, indicative planning, and strategic investment budgets to manage the green transition.

Hannah Bensussan (Political Economist and EU Economic Policy Expert; Advanced background in institutional economics) will analyze the current French institutional landscape, critique the successes and failures of its planning ministry, and explore how the macroeconomic proposals of *La France Insoumise* can be expanded for broader European policy.

ASE Member Spotlight: Jon Wisman

In this interview, Professor Jon Wisman discusses his book, *Why We Must Work: Economic Freedom, Fulfilling Work, and Workplace Democracy*. Wisman outlines the central premise of his work: human beings evolved to find work naturally fulfilling, pleasurable, and integrated with leisure, community, and social respect. However, the rise of elite-controlled states roughly 5,500 years ago debased work into an unpleasant means of survival under external command—a view perpetuated by mainstream economics, which treats work as “disutility”.

Wisman argues that despite reaching material abundance in rich nations, modern society faces widespread insecurity, stress, and dissatisfaction because it prioritizes consumption over fulfilling work. To restore work to a source of human thriving, he proposes two major structural reforms within a market framework: guaranteed employment (a job guarantee) and workplace democracy (worker ownership and democratic control). He emphasizes that an interdisciplinary approach—incorporating anthropology, history, and psychology—is essential to understanding these economic dynamics. Ultimately, he frames workplace democracy and reduced inequality not only as economic improvements, but as urgent political necessities to preserve democracy and avoid global ecological collapse.

ASE Member Spotlight: Muzna Alvi

In this interview, Salewa Olewoye spoke with Dr. Muzna Alvi, a Research Fellow at the International Food Policy Research Institute (IFPRI) and the winner of the prestigious ASE Helen Potter Award. The conversation centers on Dr. Alvi’s award-winning

research examining the complex dynamics of gender, caste, religion, and female labor force participation in India.

Key Takeaways from the Discussion

- **India's Unique Paradox:** Unlike typical economic development trends, India experienced a multi-decade decline in female labor force participation. Dr. Alvi breaks down the factors behind this shift, including changing cultural norms, structural shifts in a services-led economy, longer schooling for young women, and data measurement biases.
- **The Intersection of Religion and Caste:** The interview explores why communities with similar economic deprivations exhibit vastly different labor outcomes. Dr. Alvi addresses why Scheduled Caste/Scheduled Tribe (SC/ST) women display high rates of labor participation while Muslim women face significantly lower rates, attributing much of this disparity to economic "ghettoization" and local job availability rather than purely cultural factors.
- **Policy Approaches & Solutions:** Dr. Alvi highlights practical pathways forward, emphasizing the role of India's self-help group movement, national workfare programs, and the vital necessity of supporting smallholder agriculture where most rural women are employed.

conditions under which cooperation may enhance or undermine security in three principal areas: international security, internal security and economic security. The LCCS also develops recommendations for action in politics, business, and society, focusing on cooperative solutions to the consequences of diverse security threats for Germany in the European context. As a space for research and debate on the pressing security issues of the 21st century, the LCCS connects researchers from Leuphana, Germany, and around the world with expert representatives from the field. The position strengthens the Institute of Economics and the School of Public Affairs by advancing their shared focus on “evidence-based policy” and “resilient society” within the University’s “ [Embracing Transformation](#)²⁹ ” framework.

For this position, the LCCS is seeking an outstanding researcher with an international profile to contribute to research on economic security, with a focus on macroeconomics at the intersection of international economic relations and defense economics generating a lasting impact in their field as well as for society. The research areas include topics such as (de-)globalization and international economic (dis)integration, economic dependencies and the resilience of international trade relations and supply chains. Further relevant topics are international financial integration, public finance, as well as the protection of key economic sectors and geoeconomic analyses related to international trade policy, multinational investment, and economic sanctions.

lines suggested by William Waters in his 1988 presidential address to the Association for Social Economics:

“The major concern of social economics is explaining the economy in its broadest aspects; that is, showing how human beings deal with the ordinary business of using human and physical resources to achieve a level of material comfort. Explanation includes cultural, political, and ethical details as they are needed for a full understanding. As in any economics, there are three parts to social economics. First is the philosophical base of the social economist, which may or may not be a reflection of the philosophical base or ethos of the society he/she is studying. Social economics (or any economics) builds upon it. It is the hard core as in the recent popular literature of the philosophy of science. The second part of the discipline is a description of the significant characteristics of the economy. The economist must observe the multiplicity of economic reality and abstract those characteristics that are substantive. The two together, the philosophical premises and the empirical observations, will determine the third part of the discipline, social economic policy. Policy formulation is thus a mix of the first two.”

William R. Waters, presidential address, “Social Economics: A Solidarist Perspective,” *Review of Social Economy*, 1988, p. 113 ff.

The research grant is for promising graduate students in Ph.D. programs who have not yet completed their dissertation, those holding post-doctoral positions, and for new faculty members who have not yet been granted tenure or who are tenured but have not yet achieved the rank of Associate Professor (or its equivalent outside the US). The current amount of the annual grant is up to \$5000.

To apply for the current round of grant funding, the following materials listed below need to be submitted by 5pm Eastern Standard Time on **Friday, October 30th, 2026. Unfortunately because of time constraints, extensions cannot be allowed and ALL materials must be in by the deadline.**

1. A completed .
2. A 4 to 5 page narrative (in 12 pt Times New Roman font single-spaced) explaining the following:
3. The purpose of the project: What will be learned from the research to be undertaken, and what will be its contribution to knowledge? What are the expected outputs from the work?
4. A description of the research project to be undertaken, including the issues to be examined, the research methods to be employed (this needs to be sufficiently detailed), and why this constitutes innovative work in comparison to the available evidence in the field.

5. The relationship of the project to social economics: What conceptual frameworks, topical concerns, and/or empirical methodologies drawn from social economics will be used in the present project? How is the project expected to contribute to social economics?
6. The plan of work: Include a timetable for the project, resources to be used, travel plans, etc.
7. The estimated budget: Indicate all costs that would be covered by the grant (e.g., travel expenses, research costs, summer stipend, etc.)
8. An up-to-date curriculum vitae.
9. Two letters of recommendation: For students, one letter should be from their dissertation advisor.

The winner of the Waters grant will be announced at the ASE Presidential Breakfast at the ASSA Meetings in January 2027.

2027 ASE World Congress and Summer School: Coordinator Search (June 2027)

The Association for Social Economics is preparing to hold its combined World Congress and Summer School, a two-day event, in June of 2027.

The World Congress is the largest ASE-sponsored conference, held once every 3 years and preceded by a one-day workshop titled Summer School for graduate students, junior academics, and practitioners in social economics.

The ASE is looking for coordinator(s) to host the event at their institutions or other institutions where they have contacts. Once this is finalized with the ASE leadership, the role of the coordinators will consist of:

- Being the primary point of contact for all communications with the hosting institution's admins.

Review of Social Economy: Resignation of leading editors and co-editors

Editorial note: The Newsletter office has been informed of a rupture at the Review of Social Economy, which has led to a mass resignation of the current main and associate editors. Below we share statements by the (former) RoSE editors as well as a statement from ASE as governing association of the journal. We leave it to our readers to form their own judgement on this specific incident based on the original statements below.

However, we hasten to add that the underlying tensions emerging from dominant academic publishing routines do indeed represent a key organizational challenge for heterodox institutions. Hence, in our humble view this conflict is no occasional idiosyncrasy, but represents a systemic tension in our field. At the same time, we sincerely hope RoSE will continue to play a key role as a flagship journal in heterodox discourse.

Due to the Association for Social Economics' decision to extend the cooperation with the commercial publisher Taylor & Francis, the **members of Review of Social Economy's Associate Editors Board and Advisory Board** stepped down and ended the collaboration with ASE. In a [statement](#)²⁴⁹ issued following their resignation on July 4 2026, the main editors of the explained their decision as follows:

"With this letter, we, the co-editors of RoSE, announce our decision to step down from this role and explain why. After having worked hard on the journal, in some cases for many years, this was not a step that came lightly, but we see it as inevitable.

RoSE is currently published by Taylor & Francis (T&F), a commercial publisher, in a subscription model. The big disadvantage of this model is that most articles are hidden behind a paywall, inaccessible for many scholars worldwide. For years, we have been in discussions about the possibility of moving to an open-access model, and we have used a considerable part of the editorial budget for "buying out" articles from behind the pay wall, especially those of young scholars or scholars from non-OECD countries.

The ASE has now decided to stay with T&F, and against the move towards a subscribe-to-open model with Stanford University Press. This decision, however, means that the future path of the journal is towards a model with author publishing fees (APFs), not subscriptions. T&F have been very clear about their estimation that the subscription model will continue to decline and will soon no longer be feasible. Having the journal run on an APF model means that the income depends on authors having funds available (which is only the case for authors in privileged countries and institutions). Editors are incentivized to publish as many articles as possible, to maximize revenue. This is not a path that we, as an editorial team, want to follow. We think it conflicts with the values of open knowledge and equity in science, especially for scholars from non-Western countries that cannot afford to pay APFs.

The structure of ASE, with its financial dependence on the journal income, has created an unhealthy financial dependence on royalties from the journals. We have therefore never pushed for moving to models that would not generate any income. The Stanford UP model would, with high likelihood, have allowed generating a stable income, while preserving the quality and integrity of the journal. But ASE's leadership - with its short-term cycles, which make longer-term planning maybe more difficult than it would otherwise be - has decided that it does not want to take this step.

We have therefore decided to end our collaboration with the ASE and to step down as co-editors of RoSE.

As a matter of responsibility towards authors, we will continue - with ASE's consent - to handle the papers that are currently in the review process, but will not accept new submissions. We hope that ASE can soon form a new editorial board and take over the journal. "

A large majority of the associated editors also sent a statement that supports the position of the main editors also announcing their resignation.

The **Association for Social Economics (ASE)** commented on the transition at the *Review of Social Economy* in a [statement](#)²⁵⁰ from July 22:

"The Association for Social Economics (ASE) is announcing a change in its editorial board for one of its journals, the Review of Social Economy (RoSE).

Following our recent Executive Council meeting and vote, ASE has moved forward with continuing its longstanding partnership with Taylor & Francis (T&F), a publisher that has been committed to heterodox economics books and journals for decades. RoSE publishes on a hybrid basis, meaning that it publishes both subscription and open access

content. This means that it is an accessible publishing venue for all authors, whether or not they have access to open access funding.

The Executive Council considered in detail a proposal brought by the former editors of RoSE to move to a complete open access model with another press, a decision that would have major implications for ASE's revenues and operations. After much investigation and discussion, ASE decided by a majority vote to renew its contract with T&F to ensure the continuation of its activities in line with the Association's mission. Immediately after this decision and before the end of their contracts, the editors of RoSE resigned in unison. While the editors of RoSE insist that the journal is moving towards a model with author publishing fees (APFs), not subscriptions, this is not the case. The journal will continue to publish following its existing hybrid model as explained above.

We are grateful to all current and former editorial board members for their service to RoSE. Upcoming editorial board changes will build on their contributions while creating new opportunities for scholars from a wider range of geographical, methodological, and institutional backgrounds to participate in the journal's future. Open calls for participation in editorial roles will be published on the ASE website, listserv, and other sites in the coming days.

ASE continues to support its mission of making knowledge and scholarly work in social economics available to everyone around the world. ASE provides free membership to scholars in least developed countries and this allows access to journal content for both RoSE and the Forum for Social Economics, also published by ASE. T&F also supports initiatives to make content in RoSE free to access for readers in least developed countries, including via its [STAR initiative](#)²⁵¹ .”

Socio-Economic Review (SER): Call for Student Interns 2026-2027

[Socio-Economic Review](#)²⁵² (SER) is inviting applications for its Board of Graduate Interns. Published by Oxford University Press, SER is the official journal of [Society for the Advancement of Socio-Economics \(SASE\)](#)²⁵³ and features contributions from around the world. SER's primary focus is on understanding the socio-political foundations of the economy and the interplay between economy and society. Articles in SER explore how the economy is or should be governed by social relations, institutional rules, political decisions, and cultural values. The journal also emphasizes inequalities and politics. SER receives about eight hundred new article manuscripts annually, publishes four issues per year, and accepts about 13% of submissions. Its 5-year impact factor (2025) is 4.0.
