There is an old Daoist saying: “Those who speak, do not know. Those who know, do not speak.”

While I cherish this saying a lot, two minor adaptations seem in order to capture the role of economics in society. The first concerns the wording: if you replace the active “speak” with the passive “are heard”, you arrive at a rather accurate description of the public and political impact of economics – indeed, for much too long the wrong kind of economics has been “heard” and, thereby, has gained political and discursive impact.

The second modification concerns the interpretation. In my reading, the original saying reminds us to keep calm – and there surely is some wisdom in that. However, given the current turmoils here, there and everywhere, staying calm is probably not a totally apt strategy. Hence, I suggest a second reading that challenges the original intention – as a call for action to speak out and say the right thing (or, at least, something that comes close to it). Against this backdrop, we should welcome and support those economists who act on this call and contribute by speaking out on the relevant issues of our time.

One clear example of such an economist is Isabella Weber, who urges us to take the cost of living seriously as the key category by which ordinary citizens judge their political and economic environment. Weber has been relentlessly vocal in pointing out that the recent inflationary episode was largely driven by price spikes in essentials – energy, food, housing – that are further amplified by profit-seeking in concentrated industries. Her point is not merely diagnostic: since wages are the result rather than the origin of inflation, and since price spikes in essentials can destabilize economies and societies, policymakers should be prepared to act swiftly in the interest of social cohesion. Isabella has taken this argument to the European Parliament, to the op-ed pages and, after the last US election, into the broader debate, which culminated in her [upcoming and already widely praised book](#)⁴. While one might disagree with this or that proposal, the direction is clear: take seriously what people actually experience.

Another example comes from the economic mainstream, where the Paris School of Economics advances the systematic measurement and public communication of global inequality. The [World Inequality Report 2026](#)⁵, as a key example, compiles the work of more than 200 researchers and shows in plain numbers that the top 10% of the world’s

population captures more than half of global income while owning three-quarters of global wealth; the poorest half of humanity owns a mere 2%. Again, the report also brings concrete proposals into public debate – from a minimum wealth tax on the ultra-rich to an independent intergovernmental panel on inequality. And in June, at the World Inequality Conference hosted at PSE, the Lab went one step further and released a [Global Justice Report](#)⁶ exploring what a just global distribution of resources within planetary boundaries could look like. Here we see how the more sensible branch of mainstream economics deploys an agenda aiming to change what gets “heard”.

A final example for speaking out loudly about what matters comes from Latin America. A student recently pointed me towards the Tricontinental Political Economy research program – and I am glad he did. It is not yet particularly visible in English-language academic journals, but it has built an impressive analytical apparatus for studying dependency, sovereignty and the organisation of the world economy. Three things stand out to me. First, it is genuinely pluralist: rather than treating dependency theory as a single tradition frozen in the 1960s, the project combines different strands of structuralist, institutionalist and Marxist political economy into a coherent framework for thinking about sovereignty and development. Second, it is empirically ambitious: its Structural Dependency Index measures dependency across six dimensions for 31 countries over 28 years, built on 856 country-year observations, which provides a convincing data-driven foundation for an emancipatory heterodox political economy. Third, it is remarkably attuned to the political economy of the present: it asks where the surplus goes, who owns the decisive parts of global value chains, how dependency is reproduced through finance, trade and technology – and, crucially, how the ties that strangle peripheral countries might be loosened. Conference Theme: What Comes Next? Authoritarianism, Democracy, and the Future of the Left

The past decade has witnessed an unprecedented crisis of liberal democracy — in the United States with the rise of Trumpism, and worldwide with the spread of authoritarian politics undergirded by populist and nationalist movements. These developments did not emerge from nowhere: neoliberal policies have generated economic inequality and political polarization on a scale not seen since the Gilded Age, with disastrous consequences for working classes, the poor, and other marginalized social groups. As these conditions have become institutionalized, we are witnessing accelerating attempts to dismantle liberal democracy itself. What is the nature of the new political and economic regime consolidating today? What is its social base of support? And what comes next for the left?

#CCPS2027 seeks to develop a critical political science research program adequate to this new political moment. We welcome paper and panel proposals across a range of themes, including:

- Neoliberalism’s Long Crisis: Inequality, Polarization, and the Erosion of Democracy

2. outlines of future research projects.

Discussants will be assigned to each paper or research idea, and all participants are expected to read colleagues' papers and contribute to discussions.

The Winter Games is a broad arena. The organizers apply a broad understanding of economic history and welcome submissions from business history and other, neighbouring fields (i.e. historical political economy, social history, labour history, historical demography, history of economic thought, etc.).

Contributions from master's students and junior researchers are as valuable as those from established scholars. "Norwegian" is understood in a most liberal way, i.e., scholars either based in Norway or working on a topic related to it, independent of nationality. We also welcome contributions from other Scandinavian countries. Moreover, as a low threshold arena, papers in all stages of preparation are welcome, from your roughest draft to highly polished gems.

Conference on "Against, With, and For Artificial Intelligence – the Many Faces of Techno-Resistance" (Malmö, November 2026)

5 November, 2026 — Malmö, Sweden

Conference theme: Against, With, and For Artificial Intelligence – the Many Faces of Techno-Resistance

Polls and pundits frequently tell us that people distrust AI. Yet, governments continue to support AI firms and the value of chipmakers key to AI keeps rising exponentially. Many of the CEOs leading those firms continue to be the poster faces of a supposed fight against the elite yet have themselves had economic power and political influence at the centre of that elite for well over a decade. This one-day conference seeks to open up three seemingly contradictory faces of techno-resistance in the age of AI.

In an otherwise polarised age, 'Anti-' or 'Alter-AI' (in various forms) has become the empty signifier of a movement crossing the political spectrum as well as a proxy for wider movements against centralisation. The increasing roll-out of AI in the physical world has been met by anti-robot attacks, people posting videos of their acts and encouraging others to follow suit. Environmentalists are finding new friends as they challenge new datacentres projects. Resistance against AI can also provide a means of feedback for improving real-world use of AI, as well as resistance toward representations of AI, negotiation surrounding AI regulations, and its public use.

Yet, whilst people are seeking to resist against AI, we also see cases of people using AI as a tool to resist other targets. This includes cash-strapped NGOs seeking to compensate for reduced funding but also everyday individuals looking to improve their self-representation when contacting firms, politicians, and their local doctor. For some, utilising AI within so-called 'civic tech' opens the door to new and more democratic means for decision-making as well as strengthen communities. Others warn that the political-economic structure behind AI, including who owns the algorithms and data, means it is a fool's paradise to believe such platforms can bring new energy to the public sphere.

And we should not forget that a key part of the ideological undercurrent within Silicon Valley and its satellites remains a belief that they are developing AI as an alternative to current ways of organising society. From private settlements based on bitcoin to AI-focused religions, the demand for AI serves as a flag held by often extremely wealthy individuals seeking to resist conventional politics based around democracy and public authorities.

Given the many ways one might think about resistance in relationship to AI, the organizers invite for a full-day in-person conference in Malmö, Sweden.

The Laboratory for Interdisciplinary Evaluation of Public Policies in collaboration with the Centre for European Studies and Comparative Politics and Institute for environmental transformations organizes this workshop.

The workshop aims to bring together scholars working across intellectual history, political theory, socio-economic history, political economy, sociology, and related fields in order to foster dialogue between historically grounded perspectives on economic planning and contemporary debates about its revival. Especially contributions, examining how economic planning has been conceptualised and practised across national and international contexts, the politics of planning, and the ways planning histories can (or not) inform present-day political and policy discussions, are invited. Both empirical and theoretical papers from diverse disciplinary angles are welcomed.

Topics of papers may include (but are not limited to) the three following axes:

1. Methodologies and ontologies of economic planning : How should planning be conceptualised and studied? Does the historiography of planning require a clearly defined research object?
2. The politics of economic planning: How does planning move from a utopian ideal to an institutional infrastructure? How do struggles over expertise, priorities, and futures shape planning institutions and practices?
3. Planning histories and contemporary debates: What can contemporary debates on industrial policy, ecological transition, and economic coordination learn from past planning experiences and their failures?

These themes will also be discussed from complementary perspectives by our keynote speakers: Verena Halsmayer (University of Vienna), Emmanuel Murlon-Druol (European University Institute), and Cornel Ban (Copenhagen Business School).

Workshop for PhD-students: "The conception of evidence and the shaping of doing economics" (Iasi, November 2026)

20 -21 November 2026 — Iasi, Romania

Description:

In much of modern economics, both mainstream and beyond, the issue of evidence centres on the increasing sophistication of econometric inference. Underpinning this is a confidence that econometric models are sufficiently robust that they provide accurate forecasts of economic trends and can illuminate our understanding of phenomena. The rise of experimental game theory within new behaviouralism augments the allegedly rich evidential base. Our ability to grasp the complexities of the economy is increasing.

Yet, fragilities persist. The failure of the profession to predict (and understand) the great financial crisis is emblematic. Economics is not unique in its evidence-based turn. Social policy and medicine are prominent examples. That said, limitations and criticisms are acknowledged and debated in these literatures. Arguably, such levels of interrogation and reflection are not apparent in economic thinking.

Ever increasing model intricacy and data cleansing seem to be the most common responses to any criticism and are viewed as highly innovative. This workshop aims to furnish researchers in Eastern Europe and Central Europe with the means to question standard presumptions about the nature of evidence in economics. Through a combination of invited experts, Q&A, and group discussions, participants will be encouraged to reflect on different types of evidence, their role in analysis and argumentation, and the *doing* of economics.

GDAE Climate 2026 Updates: African “Green Revolution” Failures

2026 Climate Policy Brief

2026 was a critical year for climate science and policy. A [new climate policy brief](#)²⁵⁸ by Jonathan Harris and Grant Moore sums up recent developments and examines the prospects for the next global climate conference, COP31 in Antalya, Türkiye, in November 2026. Climate scientists have recently revised projections, with both good news and bad: the worst-case and best-case scenarios have both been discarded, still leaving a projected future with a wide range of climate outcomes. There is also both good and bad news on climate policy, with significant progress especially on renewable energy but continued inadequate policy and financing commitments. New Working Paper on “African Green Revolution”

As the Alliance for a Green Revolution in Africa (AGRA) reaches its 20th anniversary, GDAE Senior Research Fellow Timothy A. Wise finds little to celebrate. In a [new Working Paper](#)²⁶⁰, Wise shows that heavy promotion of chemical-intensive farming has generated anemic productivity growth, displaced climate-resilient African staples, and contributed to an alarming increase in the number of hungry people. As Wise has argued in [an earlier article](#)²⁶¹, agroecological systems provide a better model for Africa and the world.

New Policy Brief on One Health Circular Bioeconomy

A new [Policy Brief](#)²⁶² from the [Boston University Economics in Context Initiative \(ECI\)](#)²⁶³ discusses the case for composting and policies for a dietary protein transition. Eric Christine finds that “To resolve the mounting climate and health externalities of the US food system, policymakers must pair expanded composting infrastructure with economic incentives that simultaneously drive waste reduction and dietary shifts.”
